This gazetteer describes places in the Kingdom of Poland (under imperial Russian rule) and other Slavic countries, as they were in 1880 to 1902. Places are included from Galicia, Austria, Belorussia and many localities from the eastern provinces of Prussia; the western province of Imperial Russia; Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia in Austria (now part of Czechoslovakia), also Bukovina in Austria; and the Slavic areas of Hungary. Descriptions typically include location (longitude, latitude), number of people and animals, name of any church in the town and well-known people or events associated with the place. If the same place name appears more than once, each is numbered and described separately. Since descriptions are in Polish, if you cannot read Polish, a good Polish-English dictionary is needed.

(The above article is an excellent example of the type of information you can find on the internet.)

Deciphering Social Security Numbers

by Kenneth Cramer

(The following was posted on The Cleveland Freenet on June 17, 1996 by Kenneth Cramer.)

The SSN is not very mysterious, nor does it provide much information. The following information was taken from SSA Pamphlet 05-10633, "The Social Security Number", obtainable from the Government Printing Office, and edited by Ms. Barbara Bennett:

The Social Security Number (SSN) is composed of 3 parts, XXX-XX-XXXX, called the Area, Group, and Serial. For the most part, (there are exceptions), the Area is determined by where the individual APPLIED for the SSN (before 1972) or RESIDED at time of application (after 1972). The areas are assigned as follows:

When state aid to the aged, blind and disabled was converted to a federal program administered by SSA.

As the Areas assigned to a locality are exhausted, new areas from the pool are assigned. This is why some states have non-contiguous groups of Areas.

The Group portion of the SSN has no meaning other than to determine whether or not a number has been assigned. SSA publishes a list every month of the highest group assigned for each SSN Area. The order of assignment for the Groups is: odd numbers under 10, even numbers over 9, even numbers under 9 except for 00 which is never used, and odd numbers over 10. For example, if the highest

group assigned for area 999 is 72, then we know that the number 999-04-1234 is an invalid number because even Groups under 9 have not yet been assigned.

The Serial portion of the SSN has no meaning. The Serial is not assigned in strictly numerical order. The Serial 0000 is never assigned.

Before 1973, Social Security Cards with pre-printed numbers were issued to each local SSA office. The numbers were assigned by the local office. In 1973, SSN assignment was automated and outstanding stocks of pre-printed cards were destroyed. All SSNs are now assigned by computer from headquarters. There are rare cases in which the computer system can be forced to accept a manual assignment such as a person refusing a number with 666 in it.

My name is Jaworowski, Paul N. 5116 37th St., E. Bradenton, FL 34203-3408. I am searching for information on the following names: Jaworowski, Paul (Powel), born 1859, in Mielewo-Zabielane (Koblin Parish). Stypukowski, Caroline (Karolina), born Dec. 24, 1866 in Makow, Poland (she had a twin sister that stayed in Poland). Jaworowski, Jan. Born in Poland (UNK). Siedlecka, Maryjanna, born in Poland (UNK). Stipulkowski, Jos. Born in Poland (UNK). Sikorska, Adolplina, born in Poland (UNK). I would appreciate information on any of the above names and any relatives as far back as possible.

The following is a Polish translation of the above query:

Moje imie i nazwisko, Jaworowski, Pawel N., 5116 37th St. E., Bradenton, FL 34203-3408. Szukam informacje o nastepne nazwiska: Jaworowski, Pawel, urodzony w 1859 roku w Mielewo-Zabielane w Parafji Koblin. Stypukowski, Karolina, urodzona 24go Grudnia, 1866 roku w Makow Polska. Miala siostre blizniaczkie ktora pozostala w Polsce. Jaworowski, Jan, urodzony w Polsce (miejsce urodzenia nieznane). Siedlecka, Maryjanna, urodzony w Polsce (miejsce urodzenia nieznane). Stipulkowski, Jozef, urodzony w Polsce (miejsce urodzenia nieznane). Sikorska, Adolplina, urodzony w Polsce (miejsce urodzenia nieznane). Bardzo prosze o jakokolwiek informacje o tych osobach i takze o krewnych i przodkow.

My name is John Romat. It used to be Romatowski, it was change to Romat before I was ever born. I have been trying to trace back my ancestors but have limited information so the Archives ignore me and investigators want me in the poor house. Can you help?

There are a number of discussion groups available and are known as **LISTSERVS**. Perhaps the most widely known is **ROOTS-L**. You can subscribe by sending an E-mail letter to:

Leave the subject blank. In the body, type:

**subscribe ROOTS-L (first name)
(last name)**

An excellent discussion group aimed at Polish genealogy is **GENPOL**. Again as above, send an E-mail letter to:

Leave the subject blank. In the body, type:

**subscribe GENPOL (first name)
(last name)**

On-line Genealogy Databases

Unless otherwise specified, there are no fees associated with the use of the databases listed below. Corrections, comments, and additions are welcome. I anticipate posting this fairly often, so have tried to keep the information about each database concise, and to indicate instead where to obtain more complete information. For now, the databases are listed in random order. I'll try to impose some organization in a later edition. New in this update: On-Line Immigrant Ancestor Register (#14 below). And sad news: the home of the maintainer of the Sharing List was burglarized, leaving that list for now, and perhaps permanently, unavailable.

1. RSL or ROOTS SURNAME LIST

The RSL is a database of surnames (over 100,000 in summer of 1996, submitted by nearly 7,000 researchers) with associated dates and locations, and information on how to contact the person who submitted the surnames. Its purpose is to help genealogical researchers locate others interested in sharing and comparing data about the same families. The database can be searched interactively via the World Wide Web at two sites:

3. THE COMPUTERIZED ANCESTOR

THE COMPUTERIZED ANCESTOR is a database containing over 1,000,000 names with associated dates, places, and spouses, primarily from the USA, pre-1900. About 2/3rds of the entries have been generated from GEDCOM files and are coded to the name and address of the submitter. The remaining 1/3 are from other sources, and there is a fee to obtain more information on those. The database is available from the URL:

A feature called GenSearch allows anyone =one= free search for any surname. After that, to access the database, you must submit your

own GEDCOM. You are then entitled to sixty free days. Then the fee is a dollar a month. (Or you get fifteen months for twelve dollars if you send a check in with your GEDCOM).

7. LOMZA YIZKOR BOOK INDEX

This database is designed for genealogical researchers who are interested in Jewish records and research in the city of Lomza, Poland. In 1992-1995 an effort was made to create an index of the "Sefer Zikaron Le Kehilat Lomza" (Lewinski, Y.T., ed; 1952, Tel Aviv, Israel) also known as the Lomza Yizkor Book. The Index, completed in 1996 contains more than 5000 records of Jews who lived in that town.

There are two flavors for the database: 'shareware' and 'registered'. The shareware version includes no duplication of last names. The registered version is the entire database with all duplicated records by last name. The registered version is available for a small fee (\$7 in 1996) or pro-bono if requested.

8. GENDEX

GENDEX is "an enterprise devoted to advancing the progress of family history and genealogy research on the World Wide Web." It has a searchable database of over 400,000 names. This server indexes hundreds of World Wide Web databases containing genealogical data for hundreds of thousands of individuals, and gives you the ability to locate and view data of interest to you on any of these databases, without having to go and visit each of the databases separately. This server is also the home of the "GED2HTML" shareware program, which can create web pages from GEDCOM data.

Kashubian Research Underway

Many Polish-Americans who research their family genealogy are finding out for the first time that they have Kashubian ancestry. In the Buffalo area, where it was estimated that there were 5,000 Kashubs in 1900, we have only two

people of Kashubian descent who have an interest in their ethnicity. A Kashubian Assoc. would be better located in Winona, as there is a Polish Museum with a strong Kashubian flavor. However, the greatest concentration of Kashubs would appear in Stevens Point, WI. The need for a Kashubian Assoc. of North America is certainly needed. We need to lift the story of teh Kashubs from the history books
