

How do I find my Cleveland ancestor in the World War I Selective Service Draft Cards? By Ben Kman

All males between the ages of 18 and 45 were required to register for the Selective Service between 1917 and 1918. This does not mean that these people were all drafted, just that they stated that they were of eligible age to serve the U.S. during the war if required. There were no exceptions, even resident aliens had to register.

The result of this process was that an identification card was created for each individual that contained a variety of information relevant to the researcher, notably, the place of birth and nearest relative. However, like any resource, the information can be spotty or incomplete, but it still provides another source for tracking down elusive ancestors.

The purpose of this article is to facilitate the process for those individuals researching relatives in the Cleveland area for whom these draft cards may provide missing information. In my case, I am trying to find the birthplace of my great grandfather, Franciszek Rychlinski. He never naturalized nor began the process. He married in Poland, and his death record contains no information about his place of birth. I have also been unable to find his arrival in any passenger list Soundex index for the major ports of arrival. I am sure that many researchers can share such a tale of frustration.

To begin, the city of Cleveland was divided into 18 districts for draft registration. Typically, a researcher can refer to the Family History Library film #: 1498803 for maps which detail the boundaries of the selective service districts in the major cities of the U.S. in 1917 and 1918. Knowing where your relative lived during those years would allow you to locate his district and order the appropriate microfilm based on that and his surname. Unfortunately, the map for Cleveland is horribly washed out and the boundaries are indiscernible. Fortunately, someone noted on the film what the relationship was between the selective service district areas and the wards of the city. Most genealogical libraries in the Cleveland area and the Family History Libraries have maps of the wards of Cleveland on microfiche so you can determine in which ward your relative lived. Once you obtain this information, you can determine in which Selective Service District your relative registered.

Following are two tables, the first shows the relationship between the Selective Service Districts and the Wards in Cleveland. The second shows the microfilm numbers for the draft registration cards arranged by district and surname within the district.

When you receive your film, the cards are arranged alphabetically first by surname then by given name. This, then, begins the process of scanning the records until you find your relative and of extracting any given information.

I hope that this information helps to eliminate a step in the research process for people trying to trace their ancestors who were living in Cleveland during the years of 1917 and 1918 and that you can hurdle another brick wall in your quest for your ancestors.

Armistice Day—Veteran's Day—Nov. 11, 2002

The article above gives some information about the aliens during WW I. These aliens were immigrants who had not yet become naturalized. Many of these non-naturalized men volunteered for Haller's army and went off to fight for the cause of Poland's independence. Strange---some of these men left Europe to avoid military service. And now, here they were, putting their lives on "hold", in order to fight for the Polish cause.

In time, they returned from Europe, veterans of the European conflict. The names of the vessels on which they returned were: the *Antigone* which sailed from Poland March 30, 1920 and arrived in the USA April 18, 1920, the *Pocohontas* which sailed April 2, 1920 and arrived in the USA April 21, 1920, the *Pocohontas* again, sailed from Europe May 28, 1920 and arrived in the USA June 16, 1920, and once again, the *Pocohontas* sailed from Europe July 26, 1920 and arrived in the USA August 12, 1920. The *Princess Matoika* made two voyages, back and forth across the Atlantic carrying Haller Army veterans. The dates were: sailed May 2, 1920 and arrived May 23, 1920, sailed July 7, 1920 and arrived July 21, 1920. Another vessel named the *Mercury* sailed June 16, 1920 and arrived June 29, 1920. Finally, the *President Grant* sailed from Europe January 28, 1921 and arrived in the USA February 16, 1921. The veterans came back to their adopted country, settled down, had families and made a "life" for themselves. Some became naturalized citizens, some didn't.

It wasn't long before the European scene once again became a war zone. And now, the sons of these veterans, Polish-Americans, were being called up to serve in the US military. And they would answer the call. The table on page 4 is reprinted from *Polish American Studies* (Vol. LVIII, No. 1 2001 Spring Edition) with the permission

of the *Polish American Historical Association*. It is taken from an article entitled, *Data on Polish-American Participation in World War II*, data which was compiled by Stanley Schmidt & Sally Smyrski.

In 1944, a survey was conducted of Polish parishes in the USA to document the participation of Polish-Americans in the war effort. Postcards were sent out to 796 Polish-American parishes of which 538 responded. In the Cleveland area, Sacred Heart of Jesus and Sts. Peter & Paul parishes did not respond. St. Abalbert's parish of Toledo also did not respond. The chart on the left shows the responses of the Polish-American parishes in Ohio. One must remember that the figures given were as of 1944. There was still another year of war remaining. And notices of fallen warriors might not have reached their loved ones when the survey was conducted. In 1997, a commemorative, memorial service was held for the fallen heroes at St. Barbara's parish in Cleveland. Included in the program is a listing of the fallen servicemen from the parish:

Staff Sgt. Anthony F. Budzik, U.S.A.F.

Killed in Action, 24th Combat Mission over Europe—Received Bronze Star and Oak Leaf Clusters—Purple Heart—October 8, 1943.

Staff Sgt. Chester Wojcik, U.S.A.F., 450th

Killed in Action, 4th Combat Mission over Europe—Received four Bronze Stars—Purple Heart—June 9, 1944. Staff Sgt. Julius J. Jezior, U.S.A.F., 492nd Bomber Group

Killed in Action, 5th Combat Mission, buried at sea in the North Atlantic—Purple Heart—June 9, 1944.

Pvt. Joseph J. Budzik, U.S. 36th Armored Infantry

Killed in Action, in France—Bronze Star—Purple Heart—July 12, 1944.

Pvt. 1st Class Anthony Jakubowski, U.S. Army Infantry

Killed in Action, in France—Bronze Star—Two Battle Bronze Stars—Purple Heart—August 9, 1944. Staff Sgt. Stanley F. Bartkiewicz, U.S. Marine Corps, Infantry, 1st Bn., 5th Div., 28th Marines.

Killed in Action, on Iwo Jima—Purple Heart—Silver Star for Gallantry in Action—March 2, 1945.

Pvt. Theodore E. Kulak, U.S. Army, 10th Infantry

Killed in Action, in Luxembourg—Purple Heart—Bronze Star—Two Battle Bronze Stars—Sept. 13, 1944

Cpl. Joseph W. Sliwa, U.S.A.F., 326th Bomb Sq., 92nd Bomber Group, European Theater of Operations. Died of Service Connected Illness—October 23, 1982.



As is evident from the listing above, the chart on page 4 is not totally accurate. There were more casualties to come. And they continued to come with the Korean Conflict, the Gulf War--- and who knows how many more will come in the future.

We are all inheritors of their sacrifices. It is because of them that we are able to live the life that we do. It is right and proper that we remember them, to commemorate them with services and prayers. May God grant them eternal peace. And let us not forget our loved ones who are currently serving in the armed forces of our country. May the Lord protect them in these difficult times.

During WW II, several parishioners of St. John Cantius of Cleveland got together and decided to put out a newsletter to send to the boys who were away in service. The title of the newsletter was *The Cantian*. The newsletter informed them of what was happening in the parish and in the neighborhood. There was also a section devoted to the servicemen. It mentioned who was on furlough, who was stationed where, who got promoted and things of that nature. Several of these newsletters survived and the following is from the July 1945 edition of *The Cantian*.

Servicemen's Spotlight

Pfc. Ben Czajka recently spent a month with his brother Bill, on Luzon. He accidently met him after a month search for him all over the island. Ben is now trying to locate Frank Winiarz who is somewhere in the mountains near his station.

Frank Kowalczyk, MM3/c is now stationed on the heavy cruiser, the U.S.S. St. Paul, which is doing its share to make it plenty hot for the Nips.

Because the 99th Div. is no longer a combat unit but a high-point Div., T/5 **Ed Potulski** has been transferred to the 83rd or Thunderbolt Div. He is now in Deggendorf, Germany, 35 miles from the Czech border, but hopes to be home for a 30-day furlough in November.

Pfc. John Wojdacz enjoys being with a T.C. Ordnance Co. to which he has recently been assigned. He is now at the Port of Embarkation in Portland, Oregon.

Pfc. Chester Yurak writes that he can now speak Italian as well as he can speak Polish. He is still in Italy, and has two battle stars, Combat Infantry Badge, and a Good Conduct Medal to his credit. He wishes to say Hello to all his former buddies.

Cpl. Julius Cieslik has sent us some snapshots of his recent trip over the devastated areas of Germany in a Flying Fortress. The shots show that the Germans had everything thrown at them judging from the results.

After eight months duty aboard an L.C.T., **Joe Martowicz**, GM 3/c would rather be back in the Armed Guard where he spent 21 months in the Atlantic. He adds however, that the Pacific isn't too bad.

Membership Drive in 2003

As we all are aware, the cost of everything just keeps going up. The same is true of our group expenses. The cost of paper has gone up and postage rates have also increased. Consequently, our newsletter costs more to publish. We try to keep costs to a minimum and still, we have problems.

Our group is of a nature that we must depend on membership dues in order to survive. We cannot depend on bake sales, card parties or dances to make money. Most of our membership is out of state and the only thing that we offer them is our newsletter.
