MEMORIAL AND REMEM-BRANCE CARDS

They may be referred to as "memorial cards", "remembrance cards", "holy cards", "funeral cards", "prayer cards" and in Polish, "pamiatki". Who can forget the joy of receiving a "holy card" imprinted with a saint's picture from that favorite nun in parochial school? Or cards celebrating a

holy day and distributed by ushers during Mass?

While many think that these cards are a relatively new innovation, they have been in existence for several centuries. Originating in Europe, they were inspired by fine paintings of the saints and made from woodcut prints.

Each town in Europe had its own patron saint. The town's church was dedicated to that saint and venerated by its residents. It was an honor to have a likeness of their saint occupy a prominent place in their church.

Alois Senefelder (1771-1834), a German inventor, perfected the difficult process of lithography which eventually enabled mass-production of saints' images onto paper.

Shortly after, the process of chromolithography was developed. This

enabled saints' pictures or "santini", to be printed in color.

Throughout the centuries "holy cards" evolved. Today, they are most commonly given at funerals in remembrance of the deceased. Printed with the name of the deceased, their date of birth, date of death, and occasionally, the place of interment with the cemetery's name, section, lot and grave number listed. The funeral director's

name and address are printed at the bottom of the card. This can be an important clue to obtaining additional information on the family of the deceased; especially if the funeral director had been utilized by previous generations of the family.

Many of today's memorial cards are extremely different from their predecessors. It is not unusual to see cards picturing outdoor

scenes—majestic mountains or stately trees—or a card with a hunting or fishing theme, memorializing the

deceased by depicting a favorite hobby.


The following pages contain examples of various types of memorial cards, "pamiatki" (souvenir cards) and cards representing various ethnic groups.

It is hoped that this article will enlighten the reader as to the purpose and reason for the existence of this type of remembrance.





This is an example of a seventeenth century "memento mori" (reminder of mortality) from London, England. Note the macabre symbols depicted herein.



For a nominal fee, the family of the deceased could place a death notice in the *Detroit Evening News* of the 1890s. The memorial card would then be presented to the family as a keepsake. We are grateful to Robert James Shefferly, Sr., for permitting us to reprint this card. The deceased, Catherine Paton, is Shefferly's paternal second great-grandmother.

Note her signature at the bottom of the first card. On the reverse of the card pictured at the lower left is printed the Polish word nagroda – reward – presented for excellence in her studies.

GENEALOGY RESEARCH AT THE CUYAHOGA COUNTY LIBRARY

During a recent presentation to The Polish Genealogical Society of Greater Cleveland, I mentioned the Cuyahoga County Marriage Records 1810-1949, housed at the Fairview Park Branch Library. Since then, I've recognized several researchers who were visiting the Fairview Park Branch Library to access the microfilmed marriage records. I thought a short tutorial might be useful to those who would like to access the marriage records to further their research!

To find the Marriage record index, go to the Cuyahoga County Public Library's website at www.cuyahogalibrary.org. Click on the Research tab, then on Subject Areas. Click on the Genealogy Page icon. On the right side of the page you will see a link called Genealogy in Cuyahoga County, click on it, scroll down and choose Historical Marriage License Index. This first page contains an introduction with search tips. When you are ready to begin your search, click on the blue Historical Marriage License Index link.

The search form will appear and you are ready to search. You can search by a bride's first name and maiden name or a groom's first and last name. You can leave off the first names entirely and only search with the bride's and groom's surnames. You can also search a bride's first name and a groom's surname. The index will only search the exact spelling, so it's a good idea to search as many alternative spellings as possible.

Once you've located your ancestor in the index, print the index page or copy the volume and page number from the index. Now you're ready to access the marriage record itself. The marriage records fill two drawers in the microform shelving unit. Once you've located the drawers, find the appropriate microfilm reel by locating the volume number cited on the index page. After loading the microfilm reel onto the microfilm reader/printer, fast forward the reel until you reach the page number cited on the index page. Voila! You should find your ancestor's marriage record!

On the second floor of the Fairview Park Branch Library we have six reader/printers. We also have one workstation connection where you can convert microform images to digital images and save them to an email account, a floppy disc, a USB device, or burn them to a CD ROM. We are happy to offer unlimited printing on all reader/printers and internet workstations. For more information about using the marriage records and/or the reader/printers, please call the library at 440-333-4700 to schedule an appointment.
